

FOREWORD

The gold coins struck by private assayers and mints in the United States form one of the most interesting series in the numismatics of our country. The first of these were issued by Templeton Reid, who established a mint near the gold mines in Lumpkin County, Georgia. The next coins were those struck by the Bechtlers, Christopher and August, from 1831 to 1842 or later. Their mint in Rutherford, N. C., struck pieces from the gold of Georgia and North Carolina to the amount of over two million dollars.

Upon the discovery of gold in California and the influx of prospectors and traders there was an immediate need for a medium of exchange other than the unwieldy bags of gold dust. Several firms struck coins in 1849 and the State Assay Office of California, with Frederick D. Kohler as State Assayer, began stamping ingots early in 1850; a few of these still exist. In the latter part of 1850 the firm of Moffat & Co. were designated as United States Assay representatives and Augustus Humbert of New York was appointed United States Assayer to place the government stamp upon the ingots produced by Moffat & Co. This business was in 1852 conducted under the name of the United States Assay Office. For a full account of the preceding and the operations of other companies see Edgar H. Adams "Private Gold Coinage of California."

The Mormon coinage grew out of the same necessity and appeared early in 1849. It did not, however, compare with the California coinages in actual intrinsic value.

The firm of Clark, Gruber & Co. in Denver coined gold from the Colorado mines and produced over \$500,000 worth in 1860 and 1861. The Parsons and Conway companies were much smaller operators.

Way up in Oregon the same need for a medium of exchange produced the two pieces struck by the Oregon Exchange Co. in 1849.

It has been thought best to limit the scope of this work to a complete illustrated list of the various coinages, excepting the minor die varieties existing in some of the California pieces.

Weights are given where known, a large portion of these are taken from the catalogue of the Coins in the United States Mint Collection.



The firm of Clark, Gruber & Co. was composed of Milton E. Clark, Austin M. Clark and E. H. Gruber. They coined pieces almost exclusively from gold produced in the Colorado mines.

J. J. CONWAY & CO. Georgia Gulch 1861













Conway & Co. are thought to have been located in Parkville at the mouth of the Georgia Gulch.

MORMON COINS 1849-1860

The Mormons established their mint to coin the large quantities of gold dust received from California. All the coins were short weight in comparison with the regular U. S. coinage. The 20 Dollar piece was the first coin of this denomination to be struck in the country. It had an intrinsic value of only \$16 to \$18. The letters G.S.L.C.P.G. = "Great Salt Lake City Pure Gold."








50 Dollars 1851. Fineness 887. With 50 on reverse.




















The initials on reverse of 5 Dollar piece, K.M.T.A.W.R.G.S. stand for the members of the firm—Kilburne, Magruder, Taylor, Abernethy, Wilson, Rector, Gill & Smith. Evidently some of the partners had dropped out when the 10 Dollar piece was struck.

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
